HEALTH PROMOTION IN ACTION: QUINTESSENCE BREASTFEEDING CHALLENGE 2003

Recently, I noticed a breastfeeding mother nursing her newborn in the waiting area of Woman's Hospital and Health Centre of BC. The baby's curly head was snuggled up to mother's breast as his mother gazed down with a look of glorious enchantment. My gaze then fell on the young man and his pregnant partner who sat across in the otherwise empty waiting area. Scowls passed over their faces as they noticed the breastfeeding woman. How sad that such a natural and health giving act could be portrayed as anything but positive. How can we affect a culture that has altered the perception of normal so successfully?

Breastfeeding The Quintessence Challenge provides 2003 an opportunity to demonstrate support and celebrate breastfeeding. lt provides a focal point for media coverage and thus educational outreach to all parts of society. Effectively supporting breastfeeding women in British Columbia goes clinical interventions beyond affecting cultural change through health promotion is an integral part of effective support.

On October 4, 2003 at 11:00am (local time), women across Canada and the United States will be breastfeeding babies their as part of the Quintessence Breastfeeding Challenge 2003. The Challenge involves registered sites from Canada and the United States with the "winner" being the state/province/territory and country with the most women breastfeeding at 11:00 am (local time) on October 4, 2003 as a percentage of the birth rate. In 2001, the first year the Quintessence Challenge was held, sites in British Columbia challenged the Guinness World Record. It was clear that larger centers could take part, but small towns were left out. The Challenge evolved to a more collaborative event involving all registered sites - every woman and baby counts in this Challenge. The Challenge 2002 went across Canada with 47 sites and close to 1000 women.

This year, we have expanded to include sites across Canada and the United States. Getting involved is very easy. Look up Quintessence Foundation at <u>www.babyfriendly.ca</u> and complete and submit a registration form as a site. Sites have included health units, shopping malls, hospital rooms, community centers, coffee shops, and the Dari Dip in Manitoba where the manager provided free ice cream sundaes to all participants. Some sites have had two or three women and others have involved hundreds. Every participant receives a participation certificate - some women have framed their certificates and put them up in their homes. Last year the Vancouver, BC site had a raffle for two handmade quilts and gave monies raised to the donor milk bank.

Quintessence Foundation provides flyers, posters, registration forms, certificates. participation site etc. certificates at no cost. Quintessence Foundation is a nonprofit organization whose mandate includes breastfeeding education for health professionals and the general public. Quintessence Foundation's goal is to raise the awareness of the benefits of breastfeeding and the need community for support.

Do you believe in breastfeeding? Do you want children to reap the benefits of being breastfed? Do you wish you media attention could get on breastfeeding issues? Then aet involved - be a site organizer. Register today. Please support this grass roots effort - it really is fun for all - both participants and organizers. And spread the word! We would like every community in British Columbia to take part and demonstrate that BC believes in child health.

NEWS FROM DOUGLAS COLLEGE

Two Douglas College Breastfeeding Counsellor Certificate courses are underway this fall at the New Westminster campus, and in Comox. September students have an opportunity to participate in World Breastfeeding Week during their course and that always gives the fall semester a little extra energy. Many students are also inspired to develop their group project around a World Breastfeeding Week theme. Student projects are a significant source of material for the World Breastfeeding Week page on our BCBFN website.

Douglas College hosted our usual IBCLC Exam Preparation Workshop in July. The Douglas College 18-hour Breastfeeding Education Course ran twice in the spring in the Lower Mainland and once in the Queen Charlotte Islands, and will be offered again in the winter semester, 2004. This course is of interest especially to those agencies that are looking for 18hours of staff education to fulfill the BFI recommendations. Douglas College teamed up with the UBC Midwifery Program in September to offer a session with Ina May Gaskin on The Mother-Friendly Childbirth Initiative (which also has ten steps, the tenth step being, "Support the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative quidelines to promote successful breastfeeding"). Plans are underway for our Annual Breastfeeding Education Day in 2004, which will be held at the end of February.

Douglas College is committed to the protection, promotion and support of breastfeeding, and in participating in meeting the needs of the community as we all work towards creating a more baby and mother-friendly culture. Congratulations to St. Joseph's Healthcare! On October 16th, St. Joseph's Healthcare in Hamilton, Ontario officially celebrates the Baby-Friendly Initiative designation that it was awarded in March. St. Joseph's Healthcare is a teaching hospital in a multicultural community that has over 4000 deliveries per year and it is the second hospital in Canada to receive this UNICEF designation. Marianne Brophy from the BC Baby-Friendly Network, who was the lead assessor for this designation, describes the parents' birthing and postpartum experiences as "awesome". Hiltrud Dawson, the nurse with the BFI vision and chair of the multidisciplinary team that worked to establish these perinatal practices, are all to be congratulated. As Hiltrud explains, BFI is a journey that takes time (10 years at St. Joseph's) but every step achieved in the process is an event to celebrate. Although October 16th is the for special day parents and professionals at St. Joseph's Healthcare to celebrate and be acknowledged, the BCC and the BC

Network recognize and applaud every achievement that the many other hospitals and community health services throughout Canada and BC are making in their own Baby-Friendly journeys.

Representatives of BFI provincial and territorial committees and many government representatives from these regions met in Toronto in May. Strategies for continuina to communicate nationally to share ways of BFI promotion were a focus of the meetings. One of the actions in process is the development of breastfeeding definitions and times for data collection about infant feeding practices that could be used for databases. The goal is recommended guidelines for achieving consistency in documenting and obtaining information on infant feeding practices throughout Canada.

Documents that describe the indicators for best maternity practices and the Baby-Friendly steps continue to be refined as they are nationally reviewed. When they are endorsed across the country, the indicators will be posted on the new BCC website, that is also in process. Visit it at www.breastfeedingcanada.ca.
