Preschool Breastfeeding Curriculum

Goal of Curriculum

To make preschool children aware that breastfeeding is a natural and normal process.

Class 1 Objectives

By the end of this class, preschool students will be able to:

- Describe the term "mammal". Discover what form of nutrition all baby mammals feed on. Demonstrate how baby mammals feed from their mothers.

Class 2 Objectives

By the end of this class, preschool students will be able to:

- 1. Deduce that breast milk is the only food a healthy newborn baby requires.
- 2. Demonstrate how a baby can be positioned for breastfeeding.

Class 1: Felt Board Script

Objective 1: Describe the term "mammal"

- Does anyone know what a mammal is?
- A mammal is any animal which feeds their young babies on milk from the mother.
- Humans are also mammals because mothers have breasts which make milk to feed their babies. When a mommy feeds her baby milk from her breast, it is sometimes called "nursing her baby".

Objective 2: Discover what form of nutrition all baby mammals feed on

- This is a giraffe. The mother giraffe has teats on her lower belly hidden between her back legs where her baby can suckle milk.
- This is a whale. The baby whale feeds on it's mother's milk. The baby whale nurses from teats tucked away in slits on the mother's belly. The baby whale nurses many times during the day.
 This is a cow. A baby cow is called a calf. The calf drinks its mother's milk from her udder which is between
- her back legs.
- This is a dog. After the puppies are born, the mother dog lets them drink milk from her body until they are big enough to eat other foods.
- When a human mother is pregnant, her breasts grow in preparation to nurse her baby. When the baby is born and hungry, the mother holds her baby very close in her arms. The baby opens his mouth very wide over the nipple and sucks on the mother's breast. This sucking makes the breast produce milk.

Objective 3: Demonstrate how baby mammals feed from their mothers

This is a giraffe. The baby giraffe is hungry and needs to drink his mother's milk.

(Then using above wording, substitute whale, cow, dog and human in place of giraffe)

Class 2: Puppet Show

Girl Puppet: Jane Boy Puppet: Bobbie

Bobbie: Guess what Jane? We have a new baby.

Jane: Bobbie, what is your baby's name?

Bobbie: David. He is a boy.

Jane: What games do you play with him?

Bobbie: He doesn't do much yet. He just sleeps a lot, cries sometimes and eats a lot!!

Jane: Does he like peanut butter sandwiches?

Bobbie: No. He is too little to eat sandwiches. He doesn't even have teeth yet.

Jane: So what does he eat Bobbie?

Bobbie: Mommie breastfeeds him. Mommy says that all our baby needs to make him healthy and grow is

love and breastmilk.

Jane: But how does he get the breastmilk?

Bobbie: Mommie holds him very close to her and David opens his mouth wide over mommy's nipple and

David sucks on mommy's breast. Mommy says that milk from her breast helps protect David from

getting diseases and keeps him very healthy.

Jane: What do you do when your mommy is breastfeeding your baby?

Bobbie: I sometimes help by passing mommy her glass of juice or milk' sometimes I cuddle up close to

mommy's other side to keep her warm and sometimes I play with Daddy so he isn't lonely while

mommy breastfeeds.

My mommy is breastfeeding my baby right now. I'm going to see if she wants to read to me while

David is nursing. Bye bye Jane.

Jane: Bobbie is very lucky to have a baby brother. When I'm an adult, I'm going to have a baby and

breastfeed my baby. Bye bye.
